INTRODUCTION

The team at the AI Nurses Network are passionate about supporting nurses to develop and use artificial intelligence (AI) techniques, models and tools in nursing practice, education, and research to improve patient care and population health. By weaving together these themes in our inaugural conference, we aim to create a platform that showcases nursing innovation and leadership in AI in healthcare. The result will be a dynamic conference that inspires debate, sparks collaboration, and showcases nurses' expertise across the United Kingdom and the world.

CONFERENCE AIMS

PRESENT progress and best practices in AI development, use and evaluation that supports nursing practice locally, nationally, and internationally.

INSPIRE debate on the development of different forms of AI and its use in nursing practice, education, and research across the United Kingdom and globally.

DEMONSTRATE impact that nurses who pioneer AI can have on patient care, health service delivery, workforce development and population health.

SPARK collaboration between nurses and AI experts and industry to enable new AI models and AI tools to be developed and integrated into healthcare.

THEMATIC TOPICS

1 PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE Covering aspects of nursing practice where machine learning based predictive models and tools, generative AI, and ambient voice or AI scribing technologies among others are used for patient care and population health.

2 EDUCATION AND TRAINING Uncovering novel methods for undergraduate and postgraduate education and continuing professional training in AI and data science, with nurses as pivotal actors in delivering robust pedagogical approaches to AI-based education.

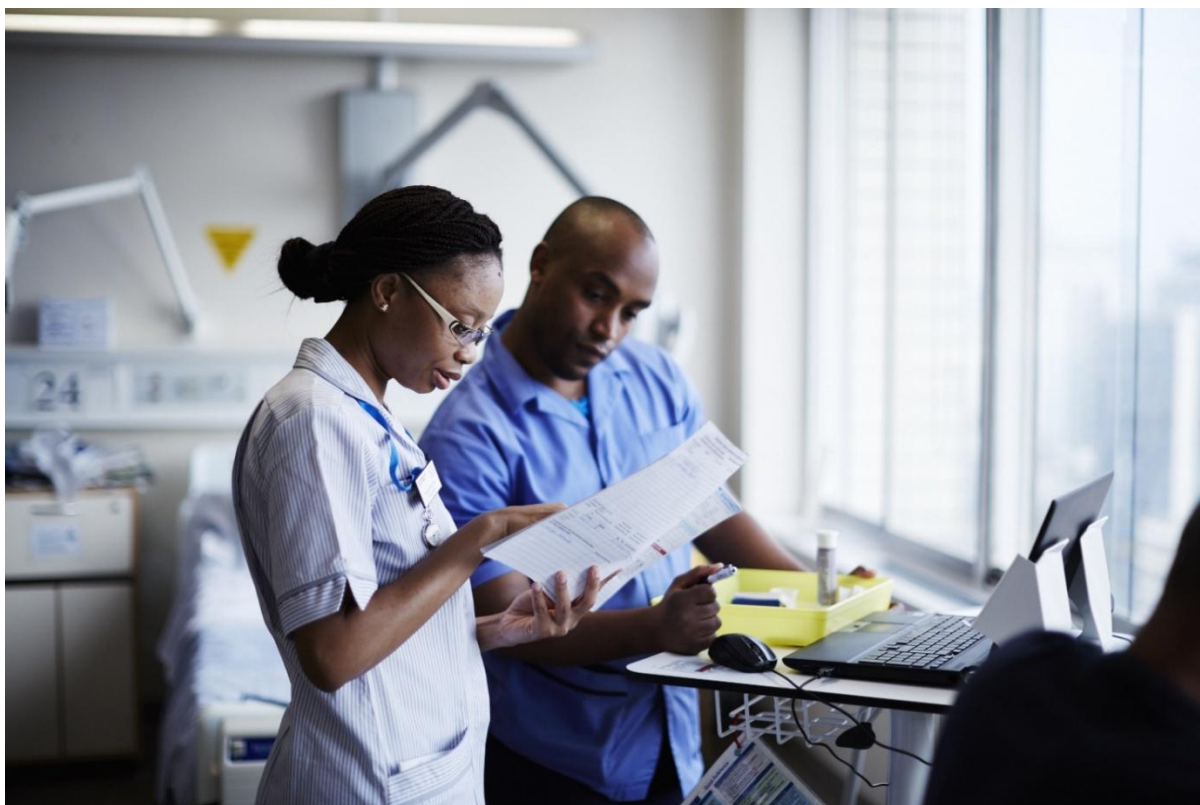
GENERAL AIMS

3 INFRASTRUCTURE AND REGULATION Exploring nurses' contribution to AI strategy and policy in healthcare, along with regulatory challenges when introducing AI-based technologies into acute hospital and primary care settings.

4 DIGITAL HEALTH ECOSYSTEMS Examining how nurses can harness AI in tandem with other digital health technologies (e.g., telehealth, wearables, electronic health records) to enhance patient outcomes, optimise resource use, and deliver evidence-based healthcare.

5 WORKFORCE WELLBEING Focusing on physical and mental health among nurses and students when utilising digital and AI technologies, and how to create supportive and safe working environments that enable care in a digital and AI age.

6 LEADERSHIP AND INNOVATION Highlighting nurses' leadership in AI development, implementation, and governance and exploring innovation pathways for creating bespoke AI models and AI tools for nurses.



SPEAKERS

Professor Clare Cable, Burdett Trust for Nursing

36 years a nurse, [Clare Cable](#) has spent most of her career in healthcare quality improvement and policy. She spent the last decade honing her leadership skills as Chief Executive and Nurse Director of the Queen's Nursing Institute Scotland where she reintroduced the Queen's Nurse Title through a nine-month transformational development programme. Since October 2024 she has been the Chief Executive of the Burdett Trust for Nursing.



Elizabeth Nassuna, Imperial College Healthcare NHS Trust

[Elizabeth Nassuna](#) is a fracture specialist nurse at Imperial College Healthcare NHS Trust. She works in the secondary prevention of fragility fractures and osteoporosis. Alongside her clinical practice, she supports the safe implementation of AI and digital tools in frontline healthcare, with a focus on how these technologies embed into real clinical workflows. For instance, she is the creator of CalciTrack, Imperial's first digital calcium intake calculator, developed to support patient education and safer clinical decision making within osteoporosis pathways. She has been selected for the NHS Clinical Entrepreneur Programme and the Shuri Network Digital Fellowship where she is developing leadership in clinical AI implementation, innovation, and equitable digital transformation across healthcare systems.



Howard Catton, International Council of Nurses

[Howard Catton](#) was appointed the Chief Executive Officer of the International Council of Nurses (ICN) in February 2019. He is committed to ensure that ICN effectively represents nursing worldwide, advances the nursing profession, promotes the wellbeing of nurses and advocates for health in all policies. He firmly believes that nurses should be at the heart of health policy decision making and leading healthcare systems and delivery. Throughout his career Howard has worked and written extensively on issues relating to the nursing and healthcare workforce and he co-chaired the first ever State of the World's Nursing Report. He has led ICN's work to respond to and support nurses globally during the pandemic and has been at the forefront of advocating for the protection of and investment in the nursing profession.

[Dr Marion Waite](#) is a nurse and clinical academic researcher based at Oxford Brookes University. Marion is also a Florence Nightingale Digital Scholar. She leads multidisciplinary projects focused on digital health, AI-enabled innovation, and improving outcomes for underserved and younger adults living with long-term conditions. Her work brings together NHS partners, industry, and higher education to co-design practical tools — from VR-enhanced learning to AI-supported clinical decision dashboards. She also leads staff development and patient and public involvement, ensuring lived experience meaningfully shapes research and implementation. Marion is committed to advancing digital capability across the nursing and AHP workforce and championing technologies that deliver real-world impact for the communities who need them most. Marion and her team were one of the inaugural recipients of seed funding from the AI Nurses Network in 2025.



Pavana Pillai, Oxford University NHS Foundation Trust

[Pavana Pillai](#) is a lead for the Enhanced Recovery After Surgery (ERAS) at Oxford University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust with a background in cardiac nursing. She leads service development, innovation, and transformation across enhanced recovery pathways to improve patient outcomes and operational efficiency. She completed her BSc in Nursing in India and a MSc at Oxford Brookes University. Pavana is part of the Oxford team that were one of the inaugural recipients of seed funding from the AI Nurses Network in 2025.

Her research focuses on the co-design and evaluation of digital health interventions aimed at improving patient health outcomes. She has a particular interest in digital health innovation, patient and public involvement, and the implementation and evaluation of AI-enabled nursing and health interventions. Her methodological expertise is in systematic reviews and realist evaluations.



Peter White, Alder Hey Children's Hospital NHS Foundation Trust

[Peter White](#) is CNIO at Alder Hey NHS Foundation Trust in Liverpool; a senior nurse working with the clinical, iDigital and Innovation teams. Having close working relationship with clinical staff to ensure they have access to the best digital solutions; Peter is transforming the way nurses deliver care for children and young people. Peter takes an active lead on nursing informatics, utilising data to improve patient care, safety and experience. Peter is an active member of the Northwest Digital Nurse, AHP and Midwifery Network, was a member of the Digital Health national CNIO Advisory Panel 2023-2025 and currently leading Nurse Led Digital Research project which is sponsored by NHS England.

Mafalda Gomes, Guy's and St Thomas' NHS Foundation Trust

[Mafalda Gomes](#) works at the intersection of nursing practice, digital transformation, and the Epic electronic health record system. Her clinical background is in critical care, having worked across several intensive care units, with the longest tenure at Royal Brompton Hospital. There, she gained extensive experience in acute and high-dependency care, serving as one of the nurses in charge of the unit and as a member of the ECMO retrieval nursing team. During this time, she completed a Postgraduate Diploma in Intensive Care and a Master of Science in Clinical Leadership.

[Tayo Onipede](#) is a highly experienced Registered Senior Nurse with over 27 years of clinical and digital healthcare experience within acute care settings. Her clinical background spans Renal, Falls and Haematology, providing a strong foundation for her work in digital transformation. She serves as the Senior Nursing Information Officer at King's College Hospital NHS Foundation Trust, London, where she has led digital nursing transformation initiatives over the past four years. Her work centres on streamlining digital workflows, including safe medicine administration via Bar Code Medication Administration and applying artificial intelligence in nursing to enhance efficiency, patient outcomes, and staff experience.



Dr Siobhan O'Connor, King's College London

[Dr Siobhán O'Connor](#) is a Senior Lecturer at King's College London, an Adjunct Associate Professor role at Western University, Canada and is a Liaison to the United Nations for Sigma Nursing. She is an internationally recognised leader in digital health, with a research portfolio of more than £6.5 million, and a multidisciplinary background in nursing and information systems. Her research focuses on co-designing, implementing and evaluating technologies in healthcare, with a particular interest in mobile health and AI innovations that can support patient self-management. She served as an external advisor on the World Health Organization on the WHO's State of the World's Nursing report 2025 and lead the AI Nurses Network.

CONFERENCE VENUE

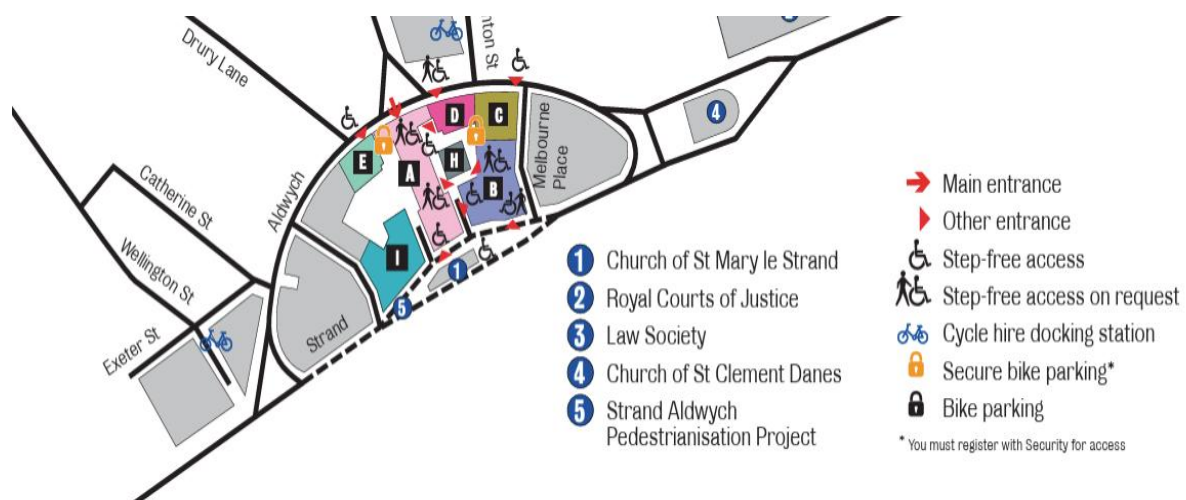
KING'S COLLEGE LONDON – STRAND CAMPUS

The conference will take place at **Bush House** on the **Strand Campus** at King's College London. The venue is **Bush House Auditorium** which is a purpose-built venue that boasts state of the art lecturing facilities.



The **Auditorium** is in the basement floor (Level 0) of the **South Wing** of Bush House (pink building on the map below). The easiest way to access the Auditorium is via the south entrance of the building located opposite the Church of St Mary le Strand on the Strand, London ([WC2B 4QN](#)). This entrance is **wheelchair accessible** and located on Level 0, so you do not need to take the stairs or lifts to the venue.

Once inside, the Arcade Café will be on your right and conference registration desk will be in this area. There are security staff at this entrance covering the electronic turnstiles which require university ID card to pass through. Please **pick up your conference badge** from the registration desk at this entrance and you will be directed through security and the electronic turnstiles to the central stairwell. From the central stairwell, the entrance to the Auditorium is directly ahead.



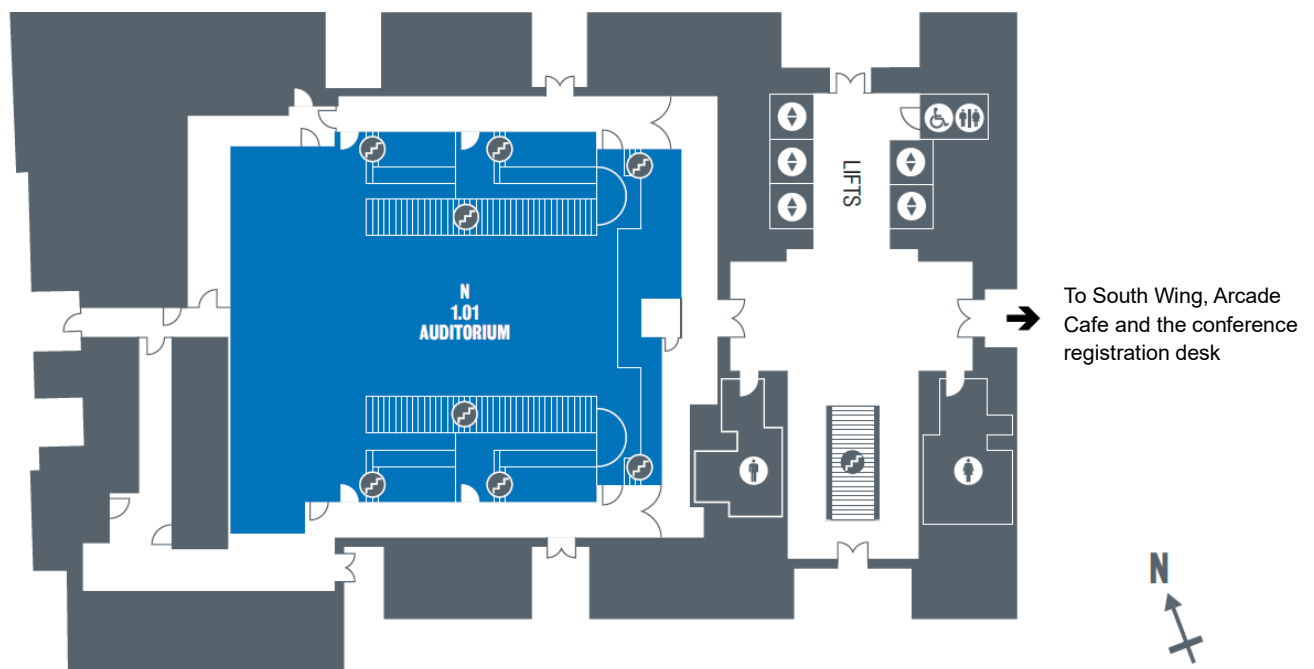
CONFERENCE VENUE



If you use the north entrance to the North Wing of Bush House located at 30 Aldwych Rd, London (WC2B 4BG) then please **check in at reception** when you arrive so security staff can direct you to the south entrance as you cannot access the venue this way. This entrance to the north wing is wheelchair accessible but only via an assisted ramp – please call 0207 848 8787 and the staff will put the ramp in place.

Please navigate along Aldwych Rd and down Melbourne Place onto the Strand to access the south entrance to Bush House. Then check in at the conference registration desk located near the Arcade Café to pick up your conference registration badge.

FLOORPLAN OF BUSH HOUSE AUDITORIUM

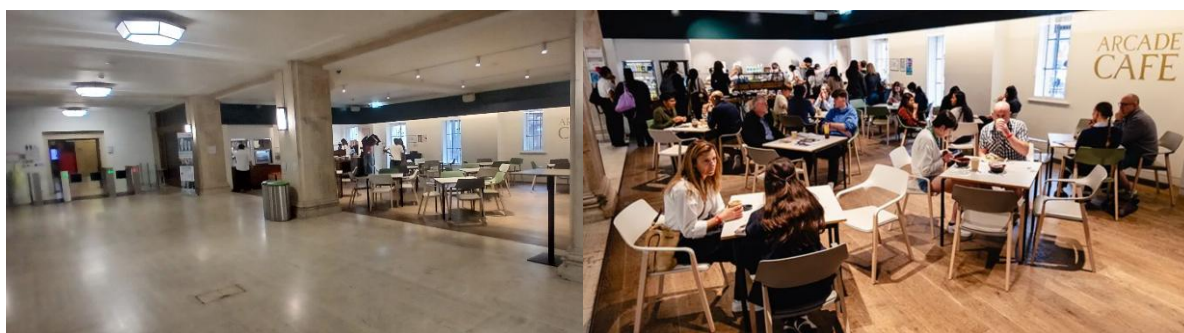


CONFERENCE VENUE

An [Eduroam service](#) is also available on campus if you work at another university and your university email and password should enable you to connect to this Wi-Fi network.

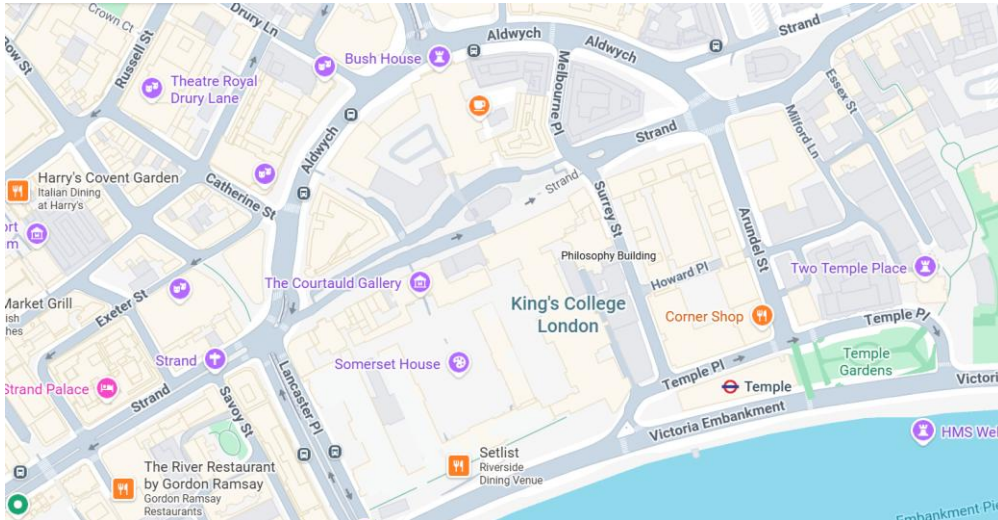
GETTING TO/FROM THE CONFERENCE VENUE

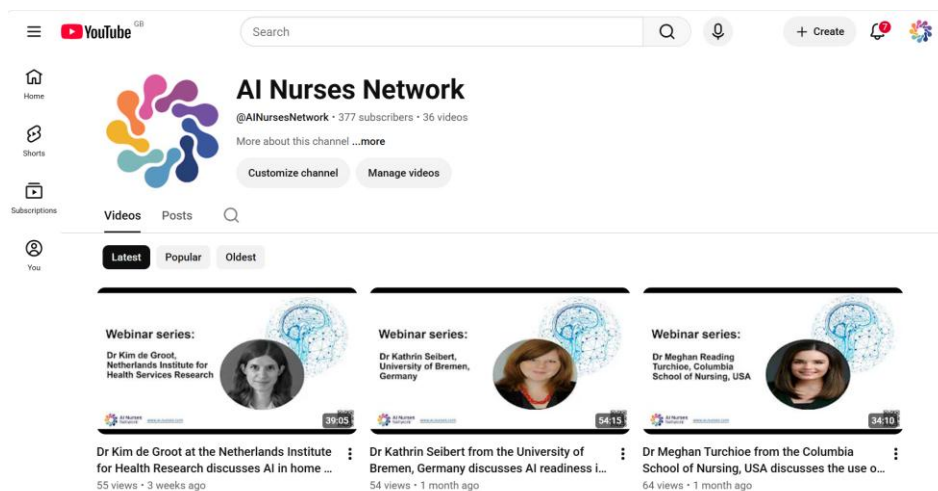
